




Acknowledgement of Country

Luke 15: 1-10

The Parable of the Lost Sheep

Now all the tax collectors and sinners were coming near to listen to him. And the Pharisees and the scribes were grumbling and saying,

"This fellow welcomes sinners and eats with them."

So he told them this parable: "Which one of you, having a hundred sheep and losing one of them, does not leave the ninety-nine in the wilderness and go after the one that is lost until he finds it? And when he has found it, he lays it on his shoulders and rejoices. And when he comes home, he calls together his friends and neighbours, saying to them,

'Rejoice with me, for I have found my lost sheep.' Just so, I tell you, there will be more joy in heaven over one sinner who repents than over ninety-nine righteous persons who need no repentance.

The Parable of the Lost Coin

"Or what woman having ten silver coins, if she loses one of them, does not light a lamp, sweep the house, and search carefully until she finds it? And when she has found it, she calls together her friends and neighbours, saying, 'Rejoice with me, for I have found the coin that I had lost.' Just so, I tell you, there is joy in the presence of the angels of God over one sinner who repents."

The Parable of the Prodigal and His Brother



Reflection

This reflection comes from Pastor Michael Chapman who is a Bush Chaplain serving in the Carpentaria / McKay Remote Area (QLD).

In Luke 15 Jesus tells three parables in a row, all with a similar message. The three parables in this chapter are often referred to as the parable of the lost sheep, the parable of the lost coin, and the parable of the lost son (also known as The Parable of the Prodigal and His Brother).

Each of them tells of God's heart for all those whom God has created and dearly loves wherever they may be. In particular, the first parable reveals Jesus' heart to be with that one sheep who is far away from the others. Jesus will leave the 99 sheep who had remained with him so he can go searching for the one who is separated. And when he finds that sheep, he joyfully puts it on his shoulders and returns to gather his friends and neighbours. He calls them to celebrate with him because of that one sheep.

Jesus was prepared to leave the 99 to be with the one, because he so dearly loves that one and really doesn't want them to miss out on being with him.

It seems to me that if Jesus was prepared to leave the 99 to be with the one, then we cannot just focus on the 99% of the population that live in cities and towns, mostly near the coast. We must also share God's love and care and the message of salvation with the 1% who live remotely.

The Australian Government estimates that 86% of the Australian landmass is home to about 2% of the population. This 86% of the country is described as being remote or very remote.

The role that our Bush Chaplains have, as they minister across vast regions that often have only very small populations, is to share God's love and care to all people, following the lead that Jesus gave in the parables we have read.

Prayers of Intercession

Oh Lord, we live in the world of pain and suffering. We are distressed by the news of wars in our world. We cannot determine who is right or who is wrong because no matter where we look we see human suffering.

And many ask where is God in all this?

From your Word in Matthew 25, dear Jesus, we learn where you are: whenever a child is hungry and crying – you are there; whenever a mother weeps – you are there; whenever a young man dies – you are there.

Lord God we pray for people who live across remote and isolated parts of our country, for people who live on the land, working hard to provide the food and resources we need to sustain our lives. Lord be with them in their loneliness, their isolation and their daily challenges.

We pray for people who have been impacted by floods, cyclones, droughts and fires across this vast nation. As people make difficult decisions to stay or to leave, to rebuild or to move on, as they replant crops, rebuild herds, start again, we pray they would know your love, your comfort and your strength.

Uphold our Bush Chaplains and the volunteers who travel to support people in their times of need. May we too be people always willing to turn up, have a chat, offer a helping hand and walk alongside those in need.

We pray for people and concerns in our own community

Lord Jesus Christ – help us to be where you are and help the helpless in our community and beyond.

Deep Stillness, the story of the song

'Deep Stillness' was first written by Julie Perrin as a blessing for a gathering of the Uniting Church Synod of Victoria. The words drew on images from the Australian landscape. Ian Ferguson created a gestural prayer to align with the words as they were spoken. The following year, Lutheran songwriter Robin Mann contacted Julie to ask permission to set the words to music – and so a three-way creation came into being.

Frontier Services later requested Julie to write an additional verse for the cold places. Because the gestural prayer does not align with the second verse, Julie has requested the additional verse not be further shared. Julie, Robin and Ian are keen to preserve the integrity of the original 3-way creation.

'Deep Stillness' has become an anthem used in the Uniting Church and beyond; published multiple times and sung by thousands of people. The original song is licenced by CCLI which is now a part of Song Select.

These include Indigenous communities, isolated properties and farms, mining communities, and other remotely located areas.
