Bible Readings

Leviticus 25: 3-5

Six years you shall sow your field, and six years you shall prune your vineyard and gather in their yield, but in the seventh year there shall be a Sabbath of complete rest for the land, a Sabbath for the Lord: you shall not sow your field or prune your vineyard. You shall not reap the aftergrowth of your harvest or gather the grapes of your unpruned vine: it shall be a year of complete rest for the land.

Romans 8: 22-23

We know that the whole creation has been groaning together as it suffers together the pains of labor, and not only the creation, but we ourselves, who have the first fruits of the Spirit, groan inwardly while we wait for adoption, the redemption of our bodies.

Luke 8: 22-25

Then he said to them, "Where is your faith?" They were terrified and amazed and said to one another, "Who then is this, that he commands even the winds and the water and they obey him?"



Reflection

This reflection comes from Rev Dona Spencer who recently concluded her time as a Bush Chaplain serving in the Bottle Tree Remote Area, Queensland.

During my time as a Bush Chaplain, I have been deeply touched by the respect and understanding that the graziers and farmers have for the land. One grazier spoke of their relationship being not one of ownership but of guardianship. She was *"maintaining the property in order to hand it over to their sons future owners"*. I am deeply appreciative of their intimate knowledge of the local wildlife, and their fondness for little wallabies of various sizes and colours even though they could be a pest!

The Leviticus passage speaks of the ancient understanding of this need for rest and rejuvenation, and the awareness of the cyclical nature of land guardianship. I often hear about the plans that farmers have for rejuvenation, and for rest in order to protect the land from overuse.

Cycles of rest, planting, growth and harvesting are evident throughout the farming communities of Australia. So too are cycles of drought and flood, bushfires and regrowth. In Romans we read how together with all creation we wait, we groan, and hope to one day celebrate and rejoice.

This connectedness with people and the land is paramount to success and wholeness in the outback. There is a placard heading west on the Warrego highway which commands our attention with the words: "it's



the people that matter". This is so true for those living in the outback. The small towns, whilst shrinking, are rich in community life where people come together to support when times are tough, and to grieve their losses, and to celebrate their successes.

As one grazier said "our community is a sense of place, but it is also our neighbours, people you can rely on in times of need. They are people with whom we can also genuinely celebrate life's good moments. It's about coming together. Whether it's bushfires, accidents, picking up a parcel in town or a chat about the weather".

The Luke 8 reading describes the disciples huddled in a boat in a storm. They cried out, together. Afterwards, they experienced the calm, together. Frontier Services has Bush Chaplains on the ground in remote areas so that they can 'stand with people in the bush' during the storms of life, and celebrate with them when the storms die down.

We are grateful that through all the seasons of life, God is with us. We share with them that they are not alone... God cares, and there are people out there who do also. Our Outback Links program is a practical expression of this love and care. As volunteers roll up their sleeves, have a yarn, and share meals, relationships are formed, spirits are lifted and hearts are encouraged.

And, good memories linger on long after the volunteers leave.
